


Specific structure within the City of Miami — charter powers.

<u>COMMISSIONER</u> leads policy direction; community liaisons serve as boots on the ground. The commissioner represents in the broader community; handles unresolved conflict and works with other layers of government.

LIAISONS connect with residents, businesses, and groups to spot and resolve issues. Involve staff and the commissioner as needed.

Coordinate with City departments for services like solid waste, parks, building, public works, code enforcement, repairs, and events. Elevate unresolved problems and policy matters to the Commissioner for action. Act as both messengers and problem-solvers to ensure community concerns are addressed.

WHAT IS OMNI CRA?

A public agency established in 1987 under the Florida Community Redevelopment Act to revitalize neighborhoods, improve housing affordability, and stimulate economic growth across the Omni Redevelopment Area. Governed by a board of City Commissioners, with the District 2 Commissioner serving as Chair, the Omni CRA fulfills its mission through:

- <u>HISTORIC PRESERVATION:</u> Safeguarding and renewing the district's historic structures and cultural fabric
- <u>BUSINESS OPPORTUNITIES</u>: Supporting local businesses with grants and assistance to foster job growth and activate commercial corridors
- HOUSING AFFORDABILITY: Promoting accessible, high-quality housing to ensure residents can continue to live in the neighborhood
- <u>INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENTS</u>: Enhancing public infrastructure, such as streetscapes, lighting, parking, bike lanes, and sidewalks, to improve livability
- **QUALITY OF LIFE ENHANCEMENTS:** Advancing neighborhood safety, comfort, and well-being through initiatives like green spaces, special policing, and community improvements

WHATIS DDA?

An independent agency of the City of Miami funded by a special tax levy on properties within its district boundaries. The Miami Downtown Development Authority's mission is to grow, strengthen, and promote the economic health and vitality of Downtown Miami. As an autonomous agency, the Miami DDA advocates, facilitates, plans, and executes business development, capital improvements, urban planning, and marketing and communication strategies. The DDA also serves as a resource hub—connecting businesses, residents, and stakeholders with community resources, partnerships, and data to help them thrive.

MPA manages and develops on-street and off-street parking assets in the City of Miami. It shares responsibility with the City of Miami Police Department and Miami-Dade County for enforcement of parking regulations.

MPA is a self-sustaining agency managed by parking industry professionals and financed by parking revenues. Funds not used by operations are returned to the City of Miami, and all ticket citation revenues are payable directly to Miami-Dade County.

MPA provides parking for approximately 6 million vehicles annually. Currently, the Miami Parking Authority has over 47,000 parking spaces under management

OTHER ENTITIES

BAYFRONT PARK MANAGEMENT TRUST

A City-established trust that manages and programs Bayfront Park and Maurice A. Ferré Park. Oversees daily operations, maintenance, events, and capital improvements to maximize community use.

VIRGINIA KEY BEACH PARK TRUST

A City-established trust dedicated to preserving the cultural legacy and natural beauty of Historic Virginia Key Beach Park. Manages historic preservation, environmental stewardship, public programming, and community outreach.

RELATION TO THE CITY

Both Chairs are appointed by the City of Miami Commission, operating as specialized park management entities separate from the City's Parks & Recreation Department and the City's adminstration.

CITY, COUNTY & STATE WHO DOES WHAT?

- <u>CITY OF MIAMI</u>: Full municipal government; handles local services like Public Works, Parks, Sanitation, Code Enforcement, and Police.
- <u>CITY COMMISSIONS</u>: Legislative body of 5 elected Commissioners; passes laws, approves budgets, and sets policy. District 2 represents Coconut Grove, Downtown, Edgewater, Biscayne and San Marco (Venetian Islands), parts of Brickell and Virginia Key.
- MIAMI DADE COUNTY: Oversees regional services such as public transit, water & sewer, the airport, the seaport, and major countywide infrastructure. It also overlays some municipal services.

- **STATE OF FLORIDA**: Responsible for statewide policy, major highways, large-scale infrastructure, and Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) projects.
- <u>COMMUNITY LIAISONS</u>: Connect residents to the right department, track and escalate issues, and bridge communication to the Commissioner for policy-level action.
- BASIC PRINCIPLES: No single Commissioner can make policy changes alone; it takes a majority vote from the Commission to pass laws or approve major initiatives.



OFFICE OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL

ANTONIO DIAZ | INDEPENDENT INSPECTOR GENERAL

To detect, investigate and prevent fraud, waste, mismanagement, misconduct, and abuse of power through independent oversight of County affairs, and seek appropriate remedies to recover public monies. Commonly known as "watchdog" agencies, Offices of Inspectors General (OIG) are found at all levels of local, state, and federal government.

In Miami-Dade, the OIG's oversight includes, but is not limited to over 25 county departments, including Aviation, the Seaport, Transit, Housing, Community and Economic Development, Water and Sewer, Solid Waste, Public Works and the Public Health Trust (JMH).





THE DEPARTMENT OF RESILIENCE AND PUBLIC WORKS


The City of Miami's Parks and Recreation Department strives to create a brighter future with a world class parks system for our community and visitors. We are home to over 150 beautiful parks, totalling more than 1,400 acres, 12 swimming pool facilities, 43 community centres, 4 gymnasiums, the Sandra DeLucca Developmental Center, the Little Haiti Cultural Center and Caribbean Marketplace, a Japanese Garden, the Grapeland Water Park, and the Melreese Golf Course. We also offer services at Virginia Key: mountain bike trails, walking trails, and beaches, as well three natural areas designated as Natural Forest Communities that include a Visitor's Center at Simpson Hammock Park, the Virginia Key 32-acre hammock restoration and interpretive trail, and the hammock at Alice Wainwright Park.

The Department enriches and inspires the community and visitors by promoting a world class park system that is safe, accessible, and facilitates a healthy and happy quality of life.


